I enjoyed meeting with the youth at Culture Camp and sharing our stories and history. We are no longer invisible. More and more people are requesting Dena'ina Athabaskan words for buildings, organizations, and activities. We are being recognized and valued. We still have more work to do, but I've seen an increasing respect.

We have been hosting state and federal dignitaries at Eklutna, sharing our story as we work to get a fitting resolution to the dam and the return of our fish. We are doing this together, and I'm grateful for your support. Chin'an.

I hope you enjoy this September newsletter. So much is happening in Eklutna. You have a team dedicated to the mission "To empower Idlughet Qayeht'ana (Eklutna Village Dena'ina) by promoting the history, culture, and identity of our sovereign nation and to assist in the education and well-being of our Tribe."

See the articles on the successful 2023 Culture Camp. Chin'an, thank you to all who helped organize, teach, and participate. Thanks to the Health Board and Southcentral Foundation, we had a successful ATV training for kids. Our youth walked away with great helmets, goggles, and knowledge of how to be safe on their ATVs.

This summer, Tami Doone supervised four youths in the CITC Rural Youth Services program. The youth attended classes at CITC, took a tour of MTA, helped around the village with clean up, and did various other character-building tasks. If you have a teenager, plan on having them participate next year!

Marc and Kenidi Cambra hosted some work parties to create the Eklutna Garden and install moose fencing. They are, along with the Land and Environment staff, building a greenhouse to extend our ability to provide produce for our members.

Speaking of food, Whitney Waskey and Kyle have done a great job at the Food Bank, expanding to offer fresh produce from the Eklutna Garden. Remember to call ahead for your food box at (907) 688-6020.

You may have noticed some new construction around Eklutna; besides the greenhouse, there is a new pavilion on a concrete pad near the garden and Member Services Building. Walter Ondola and Lewis Stephan put on a new roof on the point shed and have kept the grounds around the clinic, removing dead trees, mowing, and weeding.

Valley Transit offers Demand Response stops on the Eklutna Ramp—call (907) 864-5000 (option 2) to reserve a ride. Elders (over 60) and Youth (17 & younger) ride free on Fridays. We are working with the Alaska Department of Transportation to locate a spot for a bus shelter perhaps next year.

NVE continues to offer van rides for medical appointments. In the first half of this calendar year, we have given 50 rides to members. We've provided homeowners assistance to a few homes in the village.

Need Help with Applications and Resources?

Family Health Resources are available through Southcentral Clinics (SCF). The teams can screen and assist community members and beneficiaries to apply for additional insurance coverage and resources over the phone that may be available to them including:

Medicaid/ Medicare, Social Security, Veterans Health Benefits, TSHIP, food stamps and other assistance programs.



The ANTHC Behavioral Health Wellness Clinic (BHWC) currently has no waitlist and is available to complete same-week mental health and substance use assessments for adult tribal beneficiaries.

Below is a list of assistance programs Native Village of Eklunta offers. Assistance programs are offered to enrolled tribal members only. We have staff that will assist in filling out forms. If you would like more information on the programs listed below, or need assistance in filling out forms, please contact the main office at 907-688-6020 during business hours. Most forms can also be found on our website under the forms tab. www.eklutna-nsn.gov

- Funeral Assistance with funding for funerals \$1500 limit
- Housing Assistance Fund Assistance with morgages, utilities, etc. Excludes phones.
 \$5000 limit
- Housing Emergency Assistance with utilities, rent, etc. Excludes Phones
- Food Bank Weekly service for those who need it. For emergency boxes call the main office.
- **Home Rehabilitation Assistance** for exisiting homeowners for emergency repairs, \$5000 limit.
- **Social Services Department** They connect, strengthen, and maintain healthy family relationships. For any assistance involving family, youth, or elders.

Tribal Member Assistance Update

The bulk of NVE's pandemic related tribal member assistance funds have been depleted, however NVE still has some funds left in the Homeowner Assistance Fund (HAF). As of mid-August, there was approximately \$7,000 left in this fund. Tribal members who own their own homes and are experiencing mortgage delinquencies, defaults, foreclosures, or loss of utilities or other home energy services can apply for these funds if they are low-income per the HUD guidelines. These HAF funds could be used for mortgage payment assistance, utility payment assistance (electric, gas, heating oil, and water), homeowner or condo association fees/liens, and home repairs to prevent homeowner displacement.

In addition to these pandemic related funds, NVE continues to have HUD funds available to low income enrolled tribal members, Alaska Natives, or American Indians within NVE's tribal jurisdiction who are experiencing a housing emergency. This assistance can be used for renting or utility payments or other situations where a family may become homeless. Families are eligible only once every 3 years for these funds and the maximum amount is currently \$1,000.

NVE's HUD program offers two more forms of assistance: (1) Down payment/closing cost assistance to encourage home ownership for tribal members who are first time home buyers. Eligible tribal members could receive up to \$5,000 in closing cost or down payment assistance with this program; and (2) Rehabilitation assistance to existing homeowners for energy related repairs and upgrades on low-income family homes. Up to \$5,000 is available to assist in improving the energy efficiency of the homes of eligible families.



Carrot Soup

- 2 Pounds carrots
- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1/2 Teaspoon salt
- 4 Tablespoon salted butter
- 1 Yellow onion

- 1 Teaspoon thyme
- 3 Cups water
- 3 Cups chicken broth
- 1 Cup heavy cream
- 2 Teaspoons fresh ginger

- Preheat the oven co 400°F.
- Clean the carrots and cut chem into 1/4- inch rounds. Add them to a sheet pan, then drizzle with olive oil and salt.
- Roast the carrots at 400°F for about 35 minutes until they have softened and begun to caramelize.
- While the carrots roast, dice the onions. Add the butter to a large Dutch oven and cook over medium heat until it foams and the milk solids start to brown. Turn off the heat, add the thyme and cook for one minute, to infuse the butter.
- Turn the heat to medium and cook the onions in the browned butter until rhe onions are translucent about two minutes.
- Add the chicken broth, heavy cream, ginger, and water. Cover and leave the lid slightly ajar. Simmer until the carrots are done. Do not boil.,:•
- When the carrots have begun to caramelize, take them out of the oven.
- Add the carrots to the chicken broth. Cook uncovered until carrots easily fall apart when pressed by a fork. There is no exact time for this, but it will be anywhere from 30 to 40 minutes, depending on the age of the carrots, how thick you cut them, how long you roasted them, and the cook temp of your soup.
- Add soup to a blender, Take the center cap off of your blender lid and cover it with a towel. Blend in two batches and puree.
- Season with salt and pepper to taste, and serve. Garnish with a dollop of sour cream and a few leaves of Italian parsley.

SCF ATV Safety Course


Southcentral Foundation held its first hands-on ATV safety course in Eklutna on August 12th, 2023, giving our Dena'ina youth a chance to get acquainted with a four-wheeler's basic mechanics and driving techniques. The participants had to enroll early enough to take an online e-course discussing the importance of safety and introducing All Terrain Vehicles' basic operations. The youth came to understand the e-course was worth it once they got a chance to see the new complimentary helmets and goggles that SCF provided for them and the ATVs that they would have a chance to practice riding.



The SCF instructors demonstrated turning techniques and how to manage rough terrain and obstacles. Although the hands-on course was a half-day session (about four hours long), the time went by fast, especially as the youth got more of a feel for the vehicles. It was a great way to ensure that the youth (despite how much or how little experience they had with ATVs) got good information on how to safely handle a piece of machinery that can lead to serious injury if not operated properly.



Land and Environment News

The summer has been a very busy one for the Land and Environment Department. We have been attending meetings on the Eklutna River Restoration with our partners and the utilities. We are nearing the end of the study process that requires there be mitigation in the river. The outcome of this study process is to come up with a plan of implementation. Part of this implementation process will be completed by NVE LE Department in the future.

Spawning surveys have been completed weekly all summer to count the number of fish in the river. We have all species counted in the lower river, but again this year the numbers are low. The season is almost over and we will have an article in the next newsletter on how this year's surveys went.

Culture camp was a huge success. This event was held in conjunction with the Back-to-School event and a community picnic. Pictures are included below.

The Educational Fish net has also been a success this year. The permit is good until the end of September, but fishing has already slowed down. The road to the fish net site on the Eklutna side is eroding due to some drainage problems. We are looking into ways of fixing this. A new

fish table was made and donated this year to replace the one that was destroyed last summer at this site. We would like to remind everyone that the upkeep at this site is voluntary and if you notice vandalism to please let us know. Thank you for keeping the site clean of garbage.



NVE Culture Camp

NVE Culture Camp was held from July 31st to August 4th. This was the biggest year yet! On average we had approximately 60 people daily, with over half being youth under 18. We had excellent weather, good participation from the attendees, and great talks. Some of the events this year were bear/moose safety from Alaska Department of Fish and Game, weather and clouds from the Anchorage National Weather Service office, traditional stories of birds from the Alaska Bird Center, and we even had a visit from an actual Great Horned Owl! Elders taught processing and smoking of salmon, fish net mending, and cache building. South Central Foundation assisted in the coordination of the camp, providing rides for participants from Anchorage, crafts, and in hosting a Native Youth Games demonstration/activity.

The salmon that was smoked was handed out to any participants who wanted some on the last day of the camp. The cache that was made was raffled off. Congratulations to Anna Stephan for winning the cache!

NVE 3rd Quarterly Council Meeting notes

All seven tribal council members attended the two half-day FY 23 Third Quarter Tribal Council meetings held at the Eklunta Community Clinic Conference Room on Monday, August 21, and Tuesday, August 22, 2023. President Leggett presided.

Several tribal members attended as well, and Jackie Kenshalo presented on the successful Youth Technology Tour held this summer. Some of the highlights of the meeting included four resolutions: Two that covered grant applications by the Land and Environment division, one to pursue BIA Leases for two buildings, and one resolution to refinance two apartment buildings the tribe owns in Anchorage.

Leadership has met with federal and state dignitaries, pushing for the Eklutna River Restoration and support for the Gathering Center. A new enrollment form was authorized to include phone numbers and email addresses so if the applications are not complete, staff can contact the applicant quicker than by postal mail.

The Health Board Chair announced improvements at the clinic to include additional dental services and Behavioral Health. Financially the tribe is in sound condition. The council approved the hire of a grant writer and the pursuit of a full slate of tribal codes.

A \$500 prize will be given to the member who creates the best logo for the Community Clinic. Watch for more about this on Facebook or contact the office if you know of a graphic artist in the tribe. Repairs will be made to the tribal office so we will be looking for contractors to submit bids soon. Contact the office if you'd like to be considered for remodeling work.
